His resume is shown below:

Andrew Glazebrook is an Alberta artist who spent most of his growing up years in the hamlet of Rosebud, Alberta. Like many youngsters, Andrew found working with wood enjoyable and was taught basic skills early from his father who is a skilled cabinetmaker. Woodturning especially became an interest for him when he happened upon an old beaver lathe at the age of 11 and spent countless hours making shavings which soon carved out a direction for his life. Working with trees in the forest, complete to the end of the process is satisfying to him, and connects him in an art that goes back over 4000 years - yet ever changing. Andrew has been turning out high end craft products decorative and useful since the late 90's and is adding new work to show diversity in what he can make. He is inspired by craftsmanship of any kind, and draws from the satisfying feeling of being a maker of things which others can see, touch, feel and

cherish. Andrew is a proficient turner in all areas of woodturning which has been a compliment to him in teaching classes and has the technical skills to make good woodturners better. Currently Andrew is working on offset turnings that are representative of people of other nations in his artistic work and also expanded his business in the direction of small scale manufacturing of kitchen products using hydro pneumatic copy lathes. Although these products are not made by hand they have given him time to focus more on the areas of design and teaching while spending time with his young family.

Over the years of learning his craft, Andrew has made a name for his work and has been recognized for high quality of craftsmanship and willingness to share his knowledge with others. Andrew has been hired to teach in over 45 schools, colleges, and universities in two week residencies and offers various classes at his well equipped studio. He has also taught at three AAW conventions in the USA and demonstrated at several woodturning guilds in Canada.

Andrew resides in Red Deer County with his wife and three children.
