# Remote Demo of Carving Techniques by Joanne Sauvageau

The purpose of this presentation was to illustrate the value of remote demos and to show Joanne' s carving techniques.

The demo ran well and certainly indicated the value of remote demos in bring talent to our club.



Joanne showed us her wide ranging carving techniques Some of the projects that Joanne has used her techniques on are shown here



In order to demonstrate carving, Joanne has turned a goblet. She has outlined her carving patterns in pencil on the surface. On projects, she uses stencils, stamps or pyropaper to transfer her designs

After burning her lines, Joanne uses her master carver and an appropriate bit to carve out between the lines. She keeps the goblet fairly thick to accommodate the carving .

The final version of what a carved gobletcan look like is shown here.

# **Safety Moment**

The safety moment was provided by <u>Terry LeGaarden</u>. Terry talked about his early experiences in woodturning where he often turned with no mask and no dust collection, running his General lathe on high speed because it was too time consuming to change the belt and using gloves because his sandpaper got too hot. He has since talked to a mentor and now follows a much safer turning practice.

He also had a device installed that rings when someone enters while he is turning so he will not be distracted and cause an accident.

## • <u>Treasure Life Beads</u>

- Treasure Beads is one of the community initiatives that EWG is involved with
- Members turn lidded boxes for children at the Stollery Hospital to store the beads they receive to signify various steps in their treatment and recovery
- The specs for the Treasure Beads lidded boxes
  - Interior Dimensions 6" dia. (5" min.) / 5" height (4" min.)
  - Finials not too elaborate pieces won't break off
  - Won't tip over easily
  - Lid easy to remove
  - Safe finishing products and process / no paint / clear varnish or stain
  - All domestic woods are ok stay away from some toxic exotics
  - Burning is ok
