- <u>Skill Building-Jerry Lindberg</u> A learn-to-turn spindle class is scheduled for <u>March 23</u>, 2019 and a bowl turning class is scheduled for <u>April 13, 2019</u> to take place at Canadian Woodworking. The 6 student classes are for novice turners or people wanting to improve their skills and cost \$40/session (\$50 for non-members but \$10 can go to membership if they join). Volunteers are needed to assist Jerry with setting up the equipment or demo turning for these classes.
- <u>Mentorship Program-Terry Skinberg</u> For those who would like to develop a certain skill, a signup sheet is available, or call Terry at 780-434-6885, and he will connect you with a suitable member. Also, if you would like to mentor, let Terry know.
- <u>Shop Crawls/Shop Tours</u> are encouraged. A Shop Crawl is a one day affair that includes a demo and perhaps tea/coffee and snacks. A Shop Tour is a drop-in affair to show you equipment and perhaps special techniques. Let Bill Nester know if you are interested in hosting either one.
- <u>Outreach Programs</u> Treasure Life Beads and Parkland Brain Injury are 2 programs we support (see section later in newsletter for details)
- <u>Remote Demos</u> AAW allow connections to expert woodturners to give a lower cost method of learning new skills. In preparation for using this technique, Joanne Sauvageau will give a demo from her shop to the April meeting.

- <u>Ed Prettty</u> is scheduled to teach woodturning classes at our club June 1 and 2, 2019. His course, Beyond ABC Replication will feature spindle and bowl turning, including making tool handles. The Turning of Hollow Spheres Using a Sphere Turning Jig by Mike Golka

The sphere turning jig is shown in the photo below. The original square blank has been band sawn into two pieces, mounted in the lathe with centers and turned to round with tenons on each end. Mike usually starts with 1 3/4" stock which he turns to about 1 1/2" diameter. Since setup takes some time, he usually makes a bunch at a time.



Bottom alignment of the jig is critical. The jig below, fitted with a straight cutter, is swung from left to right as the cutter is indexed ahead to make the spherical shape





The cutter shape is shown in the picture below

The final sphere shape is coming below



Each half of the sphere is mounted below in the lathe using the tenons and hollowing starts with a modified cutter that projects out to one side.



When the two halves of the spheres have been hollowed, the pieces are glued together using Tightbond 3 glue, remounted on the lathe and the tenons cut off with a thin parting tool.



The modified sphere is mounted below between hollow holders on both the drive end and tailstock end of the lathe. The hollow holder on the drive end is held in the chuck and the holder on the tailstock end is threaded to fit on a rotating center.



The original straight cutter is then used to completely round the sphere



Safety Moment

The safety moment was provided by Terry Goguen. As a new turner, he was first afraid of his lathe As he reflected on the safety aspects he remembered when a companion using a bench grinder without a faceshield had received material in his eyes. He now recognizes the value of face shields and all the other safety equipment needed so you can be comfortable with your lathe.

• Treasure Life Beads

- Treasure Beads is one of the community initiatives that EWG is involved with
- Members turn lidded boxes for children at the Stollery Hospital to store the beads they receive to signify various steps in their treatment and recovery
- The specs for the Treasure Beads lidded boxes
 - Interior Dimensions 6" dia. (5" min.) / 5" height (4" min.)
 - Finials not too elaborate pieces won't break off
 - Won't tip over easily
 - Lid easy to remove
 - Safe finishing products and process / no paint / clear varnish or stain
 - All domestic woods are ok stay away from some toxic exotics
 - Burning is ok
 - Include a personal message and card if you wish
- Finished boxes are turned over to Bill Nestor who will deliver them to his contact at the Stollery
